He is also a member of the Edward Bennett Williams Inn of Courts.

Barry frequently writes about criminal defense and compliance issues, and serves as a criminal law expert on national television as well as for newspapers and magazines. He presently serves as a co-chair of the American Bar Association's Criminal Justice Section Sentencing Committee, and is a former co-chair of the U.S. Sentencing Commission's Practitioners Advisory Group. *The Washington Post* referred to Barry as an "expert" on federal sentencing law.

Barry regularly appears as a faculty member or featured speaker at CLE programs and seminars throughout the country on trial skills, criminal defense and federal sentencing. Recently, the D.C. Bar honored Barry for having taught courses on direct and cross-examination to its members for the last fifteen years.

Barry earned his bachelor of arts degree from Bates College in 1982, and his law degree, with high honors in 1985, from George Washington University, where he was a member of Order of the Coif. Barry is admitted to practice in the District of Columbia and Maryland.
